

Fear factor: The team had to overcome a range of challenging hurdles either by running, crawling or swimming to conquer obstacles such as Skaffell Pike, Mud Crawl, Hadrian's Walls and Ice Plunge.

Wolf Run

What is it: The Wolf Run in Stanford Hall, Leicestershire is a 10k off-road run featuring a series of man-made and natural obstacles located throughout the course. The concept behind the event was to re-create the feeling of running in natural terrain that would allow people to experience natural, raw running conditions with challenging and interesting obstacles.

Who took part: Michael French, Principal Razzamataz Barnet, Nick Furlong and Gemma Hextall, Principals Razzamataz Sutton Coldfield and Nicole Matthews and Jon Sheehan, teachers at Sutton Coldfield and their friend Emma.

Fear factor: The Team had to overcome a range of challenging obstacles such as lake swimming to mud pits, fallen trees, boggy ground, ditches, hills and dense foliage, creating a natural and wild run. Every step was designed to test each runner both mentally and physically, taking the runners back to a primal, instinctive way of running.

And they said:

"The Razz Wolf Pack came, saw and conquered the 10km of Woods, Obstacles, Lakes and Forest that Summer Wolf Run had to offer. At moments, we were up to our chests in mud and at others we were completely submerged under floating obstacles in lakes, but we started and finished as a team," Michael, Barnet.

SCHOOL OF ROCK – THE MUSICAL

Based on the iconic hit movie and with a rocking new score by Andrew Lloyd Webber, School of Rock – The Musical follows slacker and wannabe rock star Dewey Finn turn a class of straight-A 10-year-old students into an all-conquering rock band!

As well as superb performances from the adult cast, the children in this show really do take centre stage. Not only do they sing, dance and act, a number of them also play musical instruments live on stage every night.

The most notable thing about their performance is their energy. Every move is executed with power and precision, their dialogue is fast and punchy but every word is clear and precise and songs are performed with real emotion to make you laugh out loud as well as bring a tear to the eye.

From the moment the show opens, you know that you are in for a rollercoaster of a ride. Gary Trainor who plays Dewey Finn has a powerful stage presence and rock in his soul. He belts out each song with so much energy that it's hard not to join in with him. His interaction with the children is very funny. You will leave wishing you could have a teacher just like him.

Anyone with a strict head teacher may recognise the beautiful but intimidating Rosalie Mullins played by the amazingly talented Florence Andrews. As the story unfolds, you get to see the real Rosalie and how rock music has touched her soul.

School of Rock combines many of the traditions of West End musicals with the fun and energy of a rock concert. There are classic ballads such as Where Did The Rock Go? performed with passion by Rosalie, modern rock songs such as Stick It To The Man belted out by Dewey and students and a soulful rendition of Amazing Grace performed by student Tomika. A very challenging song, led by student Summer with back up from her classmates, was Time To Play, a song that all sassy girls will love to sing.

From start to finish, the energy is the theatre is electrifying and you will leave with a love for ROCK!

Meet the head teacher!

Florence Andrews plays Rosalie Mullins, the head teacher of the prestigious prep school where the show is centered. Florence trained at The Guildhall School of Music and Drama and Royal Academy of Music, where she won the Dipram Award for Outstanding Public Performance and the Cameron Mackintosh Award. Here she talks exclusively to our students.

Q. What do you love about School of Rock?

A. It's so fun loving; I think people love watching a character like Dewey who can't be anyone but who he is, and revel in watching him turn such a well to do establishment upside down. I think the show brings everyone back to being a kid. And of course it's so thrilling to see such talent from such young kids on stage. It's much more about heart and connection through music than rebellion of any kind. I love watching people during the competition near the end of the show just grinning from ear to ear, completely caught up in the joy of it all.

Q. What's it like working with the kids in the show?


A. Wonderful. They are all so incredible and inspiring and it brings such a fresh energy to a show that performs eight times a week. The kids really keep it energised and I think the older cast feeds off that energy a lot; it's inspiring.

Q. What are your top audition tips for our students?

A. It's taken me a long time to sort out my nerves in auditions so I don't know how qualified I am to pass on tips. However, looking back on my mistakes can help me in some way. I think a massive part of it is psychological. Most people who get in that audition room are good enough and skilled enough for the part and it's simply a matter of if you are what they are looking for, which you just can't control. I've now come to see that you get the jobs you are meant to and no one job will make your career, it's a continual journey, so try to take the pressure off and just trust that if you're right for the part then that's that. As simple as this sounds, just be as prepared as you can be. This isn't always that possible if you've had a day's notice (in which case go with a song you know you can smash under pressure rather than try to learn a more suitable new song in one day). My dad always said: "Luck is when preparation meets opportunity," which I really agree with. Practice in front of friends if you can so you've done a slightly nervous performance already so that's out of the way. And visualizing is a really good audition experience too.

Q. What has been your highlight during your time with School of Rock?

A. Those little moments on stage or backstage where I have to pinch myself. The whole creative team, stage management, cast, every department in our theatre are so brilliant. We all get on really well and so that's a massive perk when you feel like you're working with friends. And being lucky enough to play a part like Rosalie. She's a great comic part, the straight guy opposite Dewey's craziness which I love to play, but my favourite scene is of course the roadhouse scene. There hasn't been one night yet when I haven't been on cloud nine singing 'Where Did The Rock Go?'. I just feel privileged to get to sing that song each night and if I had to pick one thing, it would be the journey of that scene and song that reminds me nightly of why I'm doing this.

Autumn Gale



HOW TO GET NOTICED!

Thank you to Kids Casting Call Pro, one of our partner talent agents for providing us with these top tips on how to stand out from the crowd and get casting agents' attention.

1. Make sure your online casting profile is visible and always up to date.

- Add information about your experience & skills
- Upload at least one recent headshot (and a showreel - if you have one.)
- Remember to update your CV with new credits when you land the role.

2. Be proactive and apply **ONLY** for suitable roles.

- You will see a lot of amazing auditions, but you will not be suitable for all of them. Make sure you only apply for jobs, where you meet all the criteria (playing age, ethnicity, skills).
- Casting directors remember when you keep on sending them unsuitable bad applications - be remembered for all the right reasons!

3. Don't give up!

- The casting director doesn't choose or have final say over who gets a role - this is with the director and producer. You can approach casting directors directly with a CV, photo and covering letter but in many instances they will prefer to work through casting websites or agents.
- Often they will first view your headshot and decide whether or not to bring you in for a casting - always be on time and prepare before you enter the audition room!

We offer access to paid jobs (Film, TV, Commercials, Music Videos, West End productions, Indie films and many more), free career advice on how to get the most from your online presence, tips on managing your Kids CCP profile (from headshots & showreels to cover letters) and industry discounts.
